Single Lane Conditions Next Week on Several Roads for Route 202 Continuing Parkway Construction in Montgomery, Bucks Counties

KING OF PRUSSIA – Motorists in Montgomery and Bucks counties will encounter traffic backups and delays the result of daytime single lane conditions on several roadways next week, Nov. 1-5, for continuing Route 202 Parkway construction, the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation said today.

Flaggers will direct an alternating single lane of northbound or southbound traffic on Route 202 (DeKalb Pike) in Upper and Lower Gwynedd townships between Sumneytown Pike and Route 63 (Welsh Road) Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Flaggers also are scheduled on Route 63 (Welsh Road) between Stump Road and Route 202 (DeKalb Pike) in Lower Gwynedd and Montgomery townships, where traffic will be reduced to an alternating single lane Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Delays are likely at both locations during operations to install utilities and widen both roads as part of the project construct the southern connection to the Route 202 Parkway.

In addition, motorists in Warrington Township, Bucks County, will encounter daytime single lane conditions on Route 152 (Limekiln Pike) and Stump Road for Parkway construction activities.

Flagger-controlled alternating lane closures will be in effect on Route 152 (Limekiln Pike) between Route 202 (Butler Avenue) and Stump Road Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Similar single lane conditions also will impact travel on Stump Road between Route 152 (Limekiln Pike) and County Line Road, where flaggers will be in place Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Also next week, the existing detour of eastbound Bristol Road will be expanded to include westbound traffic for three weeks beginning Wednesday, Nov. 3. Under the expanded detour, Bristol Road will be closed to westbound through traffic between Stump and Upper State roads until approximately Nov. 24 for construction to widen the roadway at its approach to the new Parkway. The eastbound detour will remain in place until the end of the year.

Motorists are advised to add extra time for travel through all work areas.

All planned activities are weather permitting.

These operations are part of the project to construct the nine-mile, \$200 million Route 202 Parkway in Bucks and Montgomery counties.
